One of the first things that our new superintendent, Mr. Pablo Munoz, did when he began the position last year was formulate the current mission and vision. They took effect officially this year for the 2014-2015 school year. The main purpose for the mission and vision is to fuel,

inspire, and ignite the potential of the Passaic Public Schools. The entire school district will be better, to better prepare the people of Passaic for today's highly competitive world.

To be the best urban school district is easy to say, but how will the administration judge when Passaic is the best? Currently the best urban district is Union City and soon, Passaic will achieve the same success, if not greater.

These two statements will work together to guide all aspects of every school in the district. At PHS, students will be exposed to a variety of experiences so that they can better determine what they wish to become in life. Students will be given more opportunities to choose what they want to take as far as course offerings and programs. These specialized programs will help better prepare students for college, which is of course, the vision for Passaic. Everyone understands that this will not happen overnight, but the new administration will be taking small steps to build upon every success.

Union City school is rated as the best urban school district in New Jersey. The administration of Passaic Public Schools will model Union City to achieve the same results. This modeling happens with trial and error among all the schools in the district. The administration will monitor the success of our

students based on their performance in a variety of ways. First, administration will closely monitor the classroom environment. The administrative staff walks into classrooms asking students what they are learning. Then, the curriculum will be altered to positively affect the learning outcomes of students. The process will work in a cycle where the school staff continues to ask themselves what is wrong, giving negative results and then change the scenario to produce positive results, and then keep the positive results constant. All schools will get better and then maintain the advancements made.

Part of this process has already yielded results. The class of 2019 will see some of the new changes. Their graduation credit requirement has been bumped to 140 compared to the current 120 credit requirement. The extra twenty credits will allow students to take elective courses and broaden their educational experience.

Another improvement is the CEP or College Education Preparation program. This program exists to help students be prepared for the college of their choice. If the vision is to prepare every student for high paying jobs, then college preparation is the logical vehicle to help get PHS to that goal.

Another dramatic change for ambitious students is open enrollment for advanced placement courses. The goal is to provide students with challenges during their high school career in hopes they will accept the challenge head on, and be better prepared for it.

These changes are not being born by the school only, but by the whole community of Passaic. Successful individuals will be giving back to the community and supporting the schools by visiting and speaking with students about how they have completed years of education to achieve their goals and become professionals like doctors and lawyers.

There are a lot of positive changes happening in all the schools of Passaic. While these changes will not happen overnight, they will have a positive and long lasting impact on the lives of the students. These initiatives are the building blocks for success. Students in the Passaic Schools should expect new programs, extracurricular activities, and educational experiences.

The whole process will take time and effort. There will be a significant amount of trial and error, which is needed so that the best outcomes can be realized. However, the end result that all administrators, staff, and faculty have in mind is that mission and vision. Students should also be part of this team, so that we can all become the best in New Jersey, prepared for all that life has to offer.



While the library has been under construction for some time, the changes have been great. Walking past the folder paper artwork by one of Mr. Schmitz's art classes and through the glass doors of the school library, the new media center is a completely new and renovated space. It is unrecognizable now, when compared to a year ago.

The most obvious changes are the new conference rooms, but looking around, there are many, many more additions and improvements. There is new carpeting, a new and sleek librarian desk (complete with depressible book return), and new seating areas with comfortable gray seating, and even card catalog cabinets from the 1950's which have been repurposed as tables.

Throughout the library, there's new shelving with a fresh assortment of books still being organized, a magazine display rack that stores previous issues of magazines while also separately displaying the current issues, and a total of eight Macintosh computers available for

The complete reimagining of the library, complete with new technology and furniture has not been easy. In addition to being the librarian, Mrs. McGinnis has also taken over as a French teacher since Mrs. Nesser retired last year. Before school and for the first four periods of the day,

she attends to the library, and for the remainder of the day she has classes, all of which are taught in

the library itself.

McGinnis's full schedule has resulted in the postponement of the grand opening. Also complicating the grand reopening of the library was the pipe leak that

left some newly renovated areas damaged.

"The library also lost quite a few books as a result of pipe damage back in February 2013," Ms. McGinnis said.

Just because there is not a grand reopening, does not mean that the new library media center is not open for business. It certainly is. The before and after school library program is being staffed by Mrs. Janoowalla and Mrs. Hamade. Furthermore, there are currently two students trained as library aids. Dayanira Aguilar and Ariadni Aguilar both help with tasks including (but definitely not limited to) shelving and organizing before school, updating homeroom information in the library system, and preparing new books for checkout with barcodes and spine labels.

The library is open for an hour before and after school, when students are free to bring their IDs to take out books and use the new computers. Due to the classes going on in the library throughout the course of the day, students are asked not to come during their lunch periods as it can be distracting to the classes. The media center, at the back of the media center, is open every day for id's before homeroom begins.

All of the work and time put into PHS' new library media center renovations have turned out amazing, and the future of our library truly looks promising. So, take advantage of this great new space to study and learn. The new Media Center will be a great tool to making PHS number one.

First, from the co-creators and developers of the Call of Duty franchise comes **Titanfall.** Developed by Electronic Arts and a new studio Respawn Entertainment, comes this great first person shooter game, set in a science fiction world of giant robotic fighting machines. This is a massive first person shooter with advanced combat fighting styles and of course the robotic titans, which gives this game its name. Players must fight and shoot their way through just about everything. It is wildly fun to play, especially when piloting a great big mechanized robot warrior.

The backstory of this game is not as intense as the gameplay but still worth-while. There are two factions at war over a portion of space called the Frontier. This game is currently available only for X-box and PC. However, the game is good enough that it is worth the price of getting an Xbox. The environment is stunning with great graphics and smooth controls make gameplay easy. Titanfall will surely supply the action intense gameplay that gamers crave.

This game puts the player in a funny world that is full of crazy and terrifying fun. When Sunset City is overrun by mutants, it needs a hero to save the city. Playing as this hero means that this game lacks the multiplayer action that defines many other great games these days. However, it makes use of its unique graphics and over the top action packed adventure. Playing as an individual in this game still delivers the action rush that Sunset Overdrive brings and the comedy that flows from the mutants and the game characters means that playing this game is a rewarding experience.

Not all the best games this year are for the Xbox. **Destiny** is published by Activision and is a first person shooter that allows you to build your character and journey to the stars and beyond, as you play, fight, and develop in the distant future of mankind. While the gameplay of Titanfall is superb and the story is simple, in Destiny the story is much deeper, and darker, but the gameplay is not quite as intense as Titanfall.

Some of the backstory is that during the golden age of mankind, humanity colonized the solar system, and all was peaceful. But, everything took a turn for the worse after an event called the collapse, gamers play as a survivor of the great collapse, forming their own destiny. Players start with a basic character, but they then customize and upgrade him with new weapons, armor and other items. So, this is a role-play-

ing adventure, as well as a first person shooter. Then, you can also play online, and wherever you go, Earth, the Moon, Venus, Mars and everywhere else in the Solar System, you can bump into other players having their own adventures. It is a great experience.

To be able to do all of these types of games into one game is a great technical achievement. More than that, it all works very smoothly. However, as great as this game is, as beautiful, and as technically amazing as it is, it just is not as fun as Titanfall.

A holiday season would not be complete without another installment of the Call of Duty franchise. While there have been some missed opportunities in recent installments of Call of Duty, with clunky gameplay and weird storylines, the Advanced Warfare has brought back some of the best Call of Duty strengths. This first person shooter was developed by Sledgehammer Games and published by Activision. With Atlas's Exo suits at your disposal it has a more futuristic view of warfare, but it is not weird or corny. To maneuver through the environments, decimating enemies is challenging but not impossible. It keeps the fun of playing these types of games. Call of Duty: Advance Warfare has something for everyone to enjoy. Put yourself in the warzone of the future as you play as Jonathan Irons through in campaign mode or absolutely dominate others in multiplayer mode.

Finally, a long awaited game that has been the source of a lot of hype is **Watch Dogs.** It was developed by Ubisoft, and

is another open world action adventure game. Watch Dogs was supposed to represent the next generation of gaming. However, it seems as though the game has not really lived up to the hype. It is a mind blowing adventure, to say the least, but it is both a great game and a horrible one at the same time.

The story is appealing, set in the not too distant future, there is a massive computer interface that links all the electronics of the future so that they can work in harmony. Playing as Aiden, an incredibly skilled computer hacker, the player of this game can hack anything connected to the network.

This sounds great but it is sometimes difficult to use and while it is fun profiling people around the city, to see anything scandalous that they have done, it is also strange. Some of the video is excellent but some of it seems rushed.

While the game is low on this list, it is worth playing. It is both great to play, and somewhat addictive, but it is also a work in progress. Hopefully there is a second generation version of this so that all the details that detract from this game get worked out.

The almost non-stop action and unexpected twists and turns that occur in this book keep you from putting it down.

The Hobbit by J. R. R. Tolkien – In simple terms, The Hobbit is a classic fantasy novel that must be read by everyone at least once. 





God says don't bully




I was once bullied because I was an atheist.



What is bullying, really?

Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance, according to the government website stopbully.gov. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time. Both kids who are bullied and who bully others may have serious, lasting problems. Even when the bullying stops, usually the hurt goes on.

But bullying has to have certain components in order to qualify as bullying. For example kids who bully use their power—such as physical strength, access to embarrassing information, or popularity—to control or harm others. Power imbalances can change over time and in different situations, even if they involve the same people.

However, to be bullying the acts must be repetitive. Someone who is mean to you one day

is not necessarily a bully. They are probably just having a bad day. They need sympathy more than the authorities.

While most people think that bullying is a big

While most people think that bullying is a big kid who beats on a little kid, the truth is that there are six distinct kinds of bullying. If a bully threatens, spreads rumors, attacks someone physically or verbally, and excludes someone from a group, then they are being a bully. Physical bullying, where someone is physically hurt, is just one of the kinds of bullying. Most students will tell you that things that people say hurt just as much, if not more than getting punch. Verbal bullying is where name calling and jokes about others is used to hurt others and it is bullying

Other related forms of bullying are indirect bullying and social alienation. If a bully uses indirect methods to exclude someone from a group, by spreading stories, lies and rumors, then that is considered bullying. By pointing out the differences between someone and the rest of a group, including ethnic background, by spreading lies or stories, just to keep someone out of a group, then that is just as much bullying as punching them.


Intimidation bullying is another type, where the use of threats to frighten others makes a victim afraid to do the things that makes school fun. When a victim is afraid, they cannot concentrate on school work and will be unhappy and eventually depressed.

Finally, in this age of digital media, cyber bullying is, sadly, part of our culture. Advanced communications unfortunately means advanced bullying for many students. When embarrassing pictures, and other information is sent to specifically hurt someone, then this is a particularly hurtful kind of bullying.

Bullying can occur during or after school hours. While most reported bullying happens in the school building, a significant percentage also happens in places like on the playground or around town. It can also happen when travelling to or from school, in the youth's neighborhood, or, especially today, on the internet.

However, authorities are aware of this problem and if anyone feels like they are being bullied then they should tell someone. Tell a teacher, a guidance counselor, or a principal and they WILL help. In fact, they want to help. No one needs to ever be the victim of a bully.

However, in a survey conducted by the Hilltop Star, PHS falls far below the national averages for bullying. On the question of bullying PHS fell over thirty points below the national average. To be the best urban school district in New Jersey, PHS will need to offer rigorous classes to challenge students. New for this year new classes are being offered, more difficult classes have been initiated and easier access to AP classes has been

This year Passaic High School opened up new classes for students to take, many of which being advanced placement. Students can get college credit for taking a course here at the high

In the sciences new classes were added in zoology, (or animal biology), which is the branch of biology that relates to the animal kingdom, including the structure, embryology, evolution, classification, habits, and distribution of all animals, both living and extinct. Also related to biology is a new class in genetics, which is the study of genes, heredity and variation in living organisms. Finally, and also a biology class is biochemistry which is sometimes called biological chemistry, and it is the study of chemical processes within and relating to living organisms. So far student interest in these new classes should be added soon.

The greatest additions have been in more offerings and expanded acceptance to advanced placement courses. These classes will help PHS students broaden their learning horizons and help them in their future as they plan for college. Some of the benefits of taking advanced placement is that the curriculum is nationally recognized. It is college level so it will help students prepare for the rigorous work load of college courses. Also, if a student can pass the standardized test for the course then they will receive nationally recognized college course credit.

Guidance counselor, Mr. Gilbert encourages students to sign up for any opportunity PHS has to offer. "There are many new and exciting opportunities here at PHS this year. All students should contact their guidance counselor and organize their plan for PHS and beyond. We are all here to help," said Mr. Gilbert.

Honors and advanced placement are great opportunities, but some students still need to make up a class from past years. If coursework needs to be made up, then there are opportunities to get missed credit as well. Back On Track is a Saturday and after school program for online classes. There are four cycles allowing four opportunities to take class for credit per year. The first cycle started November 12 and ended by Christmas break; the second cycle begins January 2 (the first day back to school) and goes through February 3; the third cycle begins February 10 and ends March 19; and the fourth and last cycle runs March 20 through May 6.There are many courses and opportunities to make up any missed credits, so that students can still graduate on time, even if they have failed a class in the past.

There is also after school tutoring being offered for math and English classes. Running from 2:40 to 3:40 each subject has its own room. For Algebra I go to room M327, Algebra II room M324, Geometry room M326, Bilingual Math M229, ESL/English/SRA room M57. These is no excuse to fall behind and lose
