The fire that razed two buildings on Broadway on Nov. 13 is a sad challenge for PHS. The four alarm fire, which began after 9 p.m., spread to four buildings, destroying two.

It was tamed by the brave Passaic Fire Department. Some PHS students looked on in horror as their homes were destroyed. PSE&G arrived at the fire to shut off the flammable gas lines, feeding the fire.

As if there were a good time to be the victim of a fire, with the holidays just around the corner, this is the worst time of year to be without a home, all your belongings destroyed. Fifteen Passaic families were displaced. A hundred people are going to be without their homes for Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Even though the Senior Center has been set up as a shelter for people who were impacted by this fire, there is no place like home for the holidays. These homes are in ashy ruins

At least there were no injuries and everyone got out of the fire. These troubling times bring our town community closer together. The PHS community has always come together to help those in need. This tragedy is no different. The Octagon Club immediately

Mexican Traditions




Dear Dante,
