They also encourage students to pursue science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) for possible

career goals. SHPE encourages and facilitates opportunities to attend to local science fairs and other engineering competitions.

The ultimate goal of SHPE is to increase the presence of Hispanics studying science and engineering.

There are a lot of benefits to joining this society and becoming involved with their programs such as:

- Eligible to apply to SHPE Foundation (Seniors only)

- Eligible for national SHPE and SHPE Foundation



However there are a few membership and eligibility requirements, including:

- Middle and high school students who have an established SHPE Jr. Chapter at their school. If there is not chapter at the school there is no way to get into these programs. However, PHS does have an active chapter.
- Must be erolled in an accredited high school in the United States or Puerto Rico. Yes, PHS is in the United States.
- Must have a minimum 2.5 overall GPA. Students should be doing this anyway. But, smart students need to be involved. Math, science, technology and engineering is pretty hard.

The Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers (SHPE) aims to change lives by empowering the Hispanic community to realize their fullest potential, by opening the world of STEM awareness, access, support, and development. What better way to fulfill this mission than by impacting students in high schools at a young age?

The SHPE Jr. Chapter Program develops the pipeline of future STEM leaders and innovators while also increasing the ability of the youth, their families, and their communities to reach their fullest potential by giving them options that they might have thought were out of their reach.

SHPE Jr. Chapters are established by local SHPE Student and Professional Chapters in partnership with school administrators. SHPE Jr. Chapter members receive mentoring and develop leadership skills through the active involvement of SHPE Chapter members, corporate sponsors and community volunteers.

Upon graduating from high school, SHPE Jr. Chapter members are encouraged to continue their involvement in SHPE by joining SHPE Student Chapters in college and then SHPE Professional Chapters as working professionals.

PHS Successfully Completes Another Year of PARCC Testing

State testing has always been a struggle for both students and staff. This year has been no different. Much of the difficulty comes from the entire school testing during the same day. PHS is space limited, therefore having the entire school testing during the same days, and having all students log onto the computers to take the test at the same time, is a logistical nightmare. The short practice during homeroom was an aid to alleviating some of the chaos of all students going to various testing locations. In the end it all works, which is a testament to the hard work of the staff who organized the test, and the students who patiently follow directions and do their best to complete a suc-

This year was also hindered by a technical glitch that affected the entire state, forcing a wasted day of testing. On Wednesday of test week, all New Jersey schools testing from grades 3 to 11 were forced to postpone the test for a day, because a technical glitch that affected the entire state. The problem was later found to be an issue with the testing platform provided by the Pearson company, the company that created the exam. David Hespe, the New Jersey Educa-



tion Commissioner said, "This is not a problem on our end. This is a problem on Pearson's

David Buenofina, a junior who was taking the test said, "This is crazy. I can't believe that they wasted a whole day of testing." He commented on the fact that so much of the testing relies on technology which is unreliable sometimes.

Whether the test experience was smooth or complicated, it is a graduation requirement, so it must be taken seriously. It is odd to see a few students put their heads down after 40 minutes into the math sections. Mrs. Romero has stated that this is a graduation requirement and therefore must be taken seriously. No student can graduate unless they satisfy the testing graduation requirement.

One student who did take the test seriously was Kevin Espinoza. "The test was okay. While there was some stuff on there I haven't seen before. I knew most of it," said Kevin Espino-

za. Other students stated much the same sentiment. While the test was difficult, it was something that teachers had prepared students to take.

The language portion of the PARCC exam was also rigorous. There were selections to read, essays and short responses to write, videos to watch and multiple choice questions to answer. The language section is also long and time consuming. Josephine Comano, a junior, said, "I can't believe how long the selections were. I just kept going and working because I knew that I needed to do my best to pass this test."

The last day of PARCC testing was extended due to two additional math sections that were added, so periods 3 and 4 were cut. Students who had lunch those periods needed to eat, so they reported the gym for sandwitches which tasted really good after such a long day of testing.

After all the testing was done, the entire school community seemed to relax a bit. Like a pressure being released knowing that testing would be over for a while. Even though this testing experience is exhausting for everyone involved, PARCC is a requirement to graduation. The whole experience is stressful and a little painful, but it is worth it in the end.






1. Captain America: Civil War

- 1. Captain America: Civil War -To kick off the summer movie season, Steve Rogers and Tony Stark are under rules that require them to reveal their superhero identities. It features newer heroes in the Marvel Cinematic Universe like Ant-Man, Black Panther, and, of course, "your friendly neighborhood, Spider-Man!" Captain America: Civil War serves just enough action and suspense without overstuffing the movie (*cough* Batman v Superman *cough*) - not to mention that a portion of the movie is filmed with IMAX cameras. Opens May 6, 2016. It is well worth the price of admission for its nonstop action and even plot development.
- 2. X-Men: Apocalypse This 16year movie franchise returns to the big screen once again featuring Marvel's mutants. This addition is in the rebooted universe, which began after First Class and then continued with Days of Future Past. After the events of Days of Future Past, the X-Men's most powerful enemy, Apocalypse, wakes up in this movie's setting, the 1980s, and he wants to destroy it. With the return of Professor X, Magneto, Mystique - along with the younger versions of Cyclops, Storm, and Jean Grey – and new characters like Psylocke, Angel, and Nightcrawler, X-Men: Apocalypse brings the best of the X-Men to reboot the franchise (without actually rebooting it) into a new "Future Present" of the mutants. Opens May 27, 2016.
- 3. Finding Dory You know how Pixar is with releasing films nearly every year and they're really good.

But after a long 13 years, 2003's Finding Nemo finally gets its sequel, Finding Dory. Dory now sets off to find her family across the ocean. Featuring returns of the original cast, the movie also features new lovable characters. A comparison with the original and it becomes apparent how far animation technology, especially with for Pixar, has come. Remember how amazing the animation looked in Finding Nemo? This film blows

it away. Opens June 17, 2016.

is still trying to remember who he is. Opens July 29, 2016.





In this movie, the cryptic organization known as SPEC-TRE is trying defeat Bond by destroying his past. It's also been a while since SPECTRE was mentioned in a Bond film due to copyright reasons. With the amazing success of 2012's Skyfall, Spectre now connects loose ends of Casino Royale, Quantum of Solace, and Skyfall.

However, despite the phenomenal performance Daniel Craig does as James Bond, the movie does tend to drag in some parts. The romance is still more funny than serious, like in the previous three Bond films. However, Monica Bellucci as Donna Lucia, is very impressive and convincing at age 50, making her the oldest Bond girl in history. But the villain, Oberhauser, isn't as memorable as Le Chiffre or Silva.

Despite this, Daniel Craig has still managed to be the best Bond since Sean Connery, the original James Bond. Craig has done well as a modern Bond in Casino Royale and Skyfall, and as a more classic Bond in Spectre.

Even with this crazy story, it's still better than the terrible Quantum of Solace. It's still a good Bond movie to enjoy, but not a great one. The final verdict for *Spectre* is a 7/10.

There is Snow White (Ginnifer Goodwin) and Prince Charming (Josh Dallas) who are Emma's parents. They


saved Emma from losing her memory by sending her into the new world with magic knowing she would be the one to bring their memories back
