

Ms. Mulreany personally feels that "there is a challenge to teach AP students, it's a whole different level. It takes time and dedication."

Ms. Mulreany contributes a large amount of time to her AP students, even on Saturday mornings, when they take AP practice tests. "Providing students with these sessions allows them the time needed to practice focusing on advanced writing tasks for over two hours without stopping. 


Adele is a very well known singer and songwriter who had spent most of her life making music and expressing herself through songs, while capturing the hearts of millions around the world.

As of September 2016, Adele is the only artist to have two albums go Diamond in the last decade. This means that both of her albums went Platinum 10 times, which brings them to the Diamond level.

The last time a singer/songwriter had albums go Diamond, was to Britney Spears with *Oops I Did It Again* in the 2000's and with *Baby One More Time* in the 1990's Also, Celine Dion achieved Diamond level with *Falling Into You* in 1996 and *Let's Talk About Love* in 1997.

Adele has signed a record breaking contract for a British artist this year with Sony Records for \$130 million.

well as PHS teachers think otherwise. "The rules should be followed so students avoid consequences," says student Michael.


One of our teachers, Mr. Grant stated, "If we have a policy, we should abide by it."

Every team in the gym showed that there is no I in team.




