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Helping Students Through High School with Mrs. Romero

School life can be hard, it can be overwhelming, tiring, but also rewarding. Managing your time or keeping your personal life and work life and responsibilities aside from your school life is tough. We are at that age where we want to be in control of our lives or at least try to.

Many times insecurities and responsibilities will arise and focusing might become harder. We humans often tend to look for approval even if that includes changing ourselves.

Mrs. Romero is an assistant principal here at PHS, and all the students know that she is a great place to go for help. For that reason, I interviewed her about her own high school experience. She said that her own experience in Paterson helped her to be more understanding of the students here.

Mrs. Romero said, "I used to walk from school to my job and I lived in Paterson, so it was like a mile and a half up and down hill, to get to work. So I started freshman year and I would have to be at work at 4, and at school we'd get out at 2:50. Some days it would be a huge rush and I would have to ask people for favors for rides. Yeah, sometimes it was late hours, and as I got older it went from working in a pharmacy to working in the mall.

"When I worked at Willowbrook, it meant two buses to come home," she continued. "Sometimes I'd get home around midnight to do work, and it was exhausting. It was hard. I didn't go to pep rallies. I didn't go to the extra stuff in my senior year because I worked. So I missed on some of the fun cool high school stuff."

She admitted that time management was a challenge for her just like it is for many of us. That is just part of the high school experience.

Giving advice to the students of PHS, Mrs. Romero said that time management, as well as dealing with personal insecurities is a problem for high school students everywhere, not just at PHS. Just like time management, insecurities make a part of teenage troubles too. Mrs. Romero relayed her thoughts about some of the troubles that high school students find themselves in, that throughout history students feel like they have to "fit in" and from time to time our insecurities lead us to tell white lies, to pretend to live as something that we are not, and because we are afraid of what others might think, of what they might say.

Our own insecurities or "weak links" lead us to feel uncomfortable in our own skin, and sometimes we create these insecurities. We become caught up in the thought that someone might be watching, that they might be staring, but in reality we forget that they aren't staring or that maybe they are but not for the reason we might think.

Mrs. Romero talked about her insecurities and how much high school changed her. Like anyone else she had to deal with insecurities. Growing up Mrs. Romero was a shy student full of insecurities who was giving her best trying to get through high school. In other words she was and probably still is just like us.

"In grammar school I fit in more, I didn't feel awkward," is what she said when she was asked to remember her elementary years. Mrs.Romero also stated that the years before high school are those years where everyone gets along and no one's really worried about appearance or trying that hard to fit in.

She concluded with advice for all PHS students, "Focus on you, focus on developing you, the you that's on paper, the inner you...I feel like we are a society that puts too much on what people think."

When asked for advice, she said that she honestly doesn't remember how she got through high school, because of how pressuring, how hard, and how emotional those years were to her, but what she does remember is persisting. Mrs. Romero persisted even when things weren't looking so bright for her in her personal

life, she kept going even when her insecurities were eating at her.

There was a time where she too, just like any other high school student, put too much weight on other people's opinion and aimed for approval. Today maybe a couple of insecurities might arise but even though she does like receiving the approval of others she wants students to know that they shouldn't worry about what others think.

Even today as an assistant principal she still thinks about what others say. She said, "I think it's human nature to want to fit in, I think it's human nature to look for and want to receive acceptance, whether it's in our home or in school."

So Mrs. Romero knows how hard it is to manage your time, to keep your personal life aside in high school. She knows just how hard it can get when our insecurities get the best of us and how we tend to look for approval that we don't really need. In the end it has helped her relate to the students.

Graphic Design Pathway Teaches Students to Create Digital Art

One of the most popular pathways at PHS is the Graphic Design Pathway. There are a few classes already set up for students and there are more on the way. First, there are introductory courses to introduce students to graphic arts, what it is and what it is used for. Also covered is the the mechanics of graphic design, creating projects and using the technology becoming familiar with the programs that allow students to create graphics like pros. The last course is dual enrollment, which means that as you are getting your high school credit and having fun learning a lot, you also get (as long as you do your work and keep your grades up) college credits.

The dual enrollment course offers college credits up to \$20,000 to students that will continue their education at William Paterson. It is also 2 periods long because of the projects they work on. This course helps the PHS community because students in this course create designs and logos for use around the district. For example, the dual enrollment course is currently in the process of creating the logo for school #1. Taking Graphic Design 1 and 2 will show you how to create digital art on the basic applications and websites such as Google Drawings

Image A, abovem is Google Drawings which is what you will mostly use for graphic design courses 1 and 2. Image B is an example of what work you will be doing. This is the basics which is learning about typefaces and using this to create the face of an animal. The one I did was a bear and as you can see it was created with letters and symbols.

Each class leads the student through more detailed and complex projects. The more students learn about graphic design



Image A the more they can do. Using programs like Photoshop, Adobe Illustrator, Adobe Premiere, inDesign, and many others. In the dual enrollment course and Graphic Design 2 you will mostly use Adobe illustrator and Photoshop. These are the same tools that professional graphic artists use, so there is a direct line between the classes here at PHS and the future careers of

Image C is from Adobe Illustrator and as you can see this has way more tools and variety for creating what you wish. There's tools for shapes, drawing, color changing, text, and much more. Anything that comes to your mind you can create in Iillustrator. However, it is just a tool to create graphics, it is the creativity of the artist that creates the art.

Both of these projects of mine (Image D and Image E) were created in Adobe Illustrator and in the images you can see the variety this application gives. Compared to what was done on Google Drawings, Adobe Illustrator really gives you more options and tools to use to create





way, giving students with artistic tendencies a chance to show what they can do. Forensic science is a great pathway for those who want to work like they are watching Law and Order. The problemsolving using science is a challenge and also fun too. The financial pathway is for those students who will be the next business leaders. Sports medicine and automotive are other areas where students can get to work in areas that they are inter-

Many of the classes offered are what is called, DUAL ENROLLMENT. That means that while you are taking this class in high school, which you would have to do anyway, you are also getting college credit (as long as you meet the requirements). As long as you are enrolled and getting good grades you received college credits from either Passaic County Community College or William Paterson University that can be transferred to wherever you decide to go when you

For example, if you are in the education pathway, you will take modern education and childhood development. These classes have two semesters in which you switch between Mr. Vallila and Mrs. Aarons. When you pass these classes you will receive credit from WPU. It is like taking these classes there, just without the tuition. It is a GREAT opportunity for PHS students.

Taking the Education Pathway, or any of the others, is not just about getting ahead, there is a lot of to learn about the subject and about yourself. If you are interested in the education of young children this course is interesting because you will find out what they are learning and how people learn from childhood to adulthood.

The history of modern education semester goes through the basics of how education has developed over the years. It goes into depth about how certain things affected the way things were taught. The Enlightenment, racial issues, economic systems and imperi-

alism have all had a role in the way education has evolved in this country. The course certainly shows how many did not have the same access to a good education in the past.

Taking the Education Pathway, these courses are interesting and creates an appreciation for the quality of education and the availability of the education that we have

As for the college credits being offered in these dual enrollment classes, that is just a bonus because of the relationship that has been created between PHS and William Paterson University. Even if you decide to go another direction after you graduate, then these credits will transfer to another university.

The Graphic Design Pathway is another very popular path for PHS students. Mr. Ricklefs teaches all the basics of graphic design and the many programs and tools of a grpahic designer. This is a practical program too, because tickets for school events as well as shirts and posters are designed by the students themselves in these classes. This is an area where PHS has an edge in technology because students are able to use Apple Mac computers, just like in that industry. Students who take these classes say that they are getting to express themselves creatively as well as work on their technical computer skills as

Other comments about this class are that "the teacher is chill that understands and helps out whenever you're having troubgle thinking of a design or how to work on a certain program." Another student said, "I enjoy taking that class while being able to learn skills that will help with my future in pursuing a career in graphic design.

One thing is for certain. These pathways are giving PHS students a great opportunity to get a taste of what they might want to pursue in the future, while at the same time getting a jump on college credits and also having some educational fun while they are

Although I finally gained some weight this year, before I was at least 135lbs and skinny but fast. Seeing the success of Peyton Manning gave me hope


that I could succeed too.
